Colleagues:

The 2014 Legislative Session is wrapping up today. The Senate is in town an extra day to debate their remaining priority legislation and the Assembly adjourned in the wee hours of the morning. We are expecting the Senate to adjourn later this evening. For your convenience, we have developed this document as a guide to the health, housing and long term care legislation that LeadingAge New York followed over the course of the Legislative Session.

All in all, we are very pleased with the outcome of this session and would not have reached our goals if it weren't for your advocacy efforts – **thank you for all of your help!** Right now we are waiting for our CCRC Continuing Care at Home legislation, which passed both houses, to be <u>approved by the Governor</u>. The Legislature also passed legislation that would delay the implementation for criminal history record checks of prospective employees of adult homes, enriched housing programs or residences for adults. Many of the bills we opposed, including nurse staffing ratios, failed to advance this year. Nurse staffing ratio legislation made its way through to the Assembly Ways & Means Committee where it died – this happened last year, as well. The bill did not move at all through the Senate since its introduction in January. It's most likely that this bill will be taken up again next year. Thank you to all of our members who took part in numerous advocacy initiatives throughout the year to help us defeat this bill. In total, 102 letters in opposition were sent to members of the Legislature.

In addition to our own priorities, the Legislature and Gov. Cuomo had their own. In the final days of session, the Senate and Assembly worked incredibly hard to get their legislation, along with the Governor's priority legislation, through each house, including the historic passage of the State's new medical marijuana program and legislation to address the State's growing heroin and opioid epidemic. Other priorities including a women's rights agenda; Common Core; and Mixed Martial Arts legislation were unable to be passed in both houses – we expect to see these issues brought up again in 2015.

Lawmakers were also unable to come to agreement on legislation pertaining to the Advanced Home Health Aide (AHHA). <u>Legislation was introduced</u> earlier this week following a program bill put forth by the Governor that would authorizes advanced home health aides to perform certain advanced tasks as determined by the commissioners of education and health. LeadingAge NY supports the legislation and will work with the Legislature next year to see it passed.

In addition to the bills mentioned above, there were also a number of appointments that were approved by the Senate to the Public Health and Health Planning Council (PHHPC), including:

- Tom Holt, president/CEO of Lutheran Social Services Group in Jamestown and also a member of LeadingAge NY;
- Ellen E. Grant, PhD, second deputy mayor for the city of Buffalo;
- Glenn A. Martin, MD, director of medical informatics for Queens Health Network;
- Ellen L. Rautenberg, MHS president & CEO of Public Health Solutions;
- Peter G. Robinson, MPH of the University of Rochester Medical Center.

Now that lawmakers will be returning to their districts, we encourage you to meet with them throughout the remainder of the year – invite them to your organizations to meet your residents and caregivers, and thank them for their hard work in helping us pass and defeat our priority legislation. Please also keep an eye on your inbox for information about the 2014 Partners in Quality Awards Program, giving you the opportunity to thank your lawmakers for their hard work throughout the year.

LeadingAge New York's Legislative Bill Summary June 2014

Passed Both Houses

These bills have passed both the Senate and Assembly, and are waiting to be signed into law by the Governor.

CCRC Continuing Care at Home Contracts

A.4611-B (Schimminger)-S.2118-B (Ranzenhofer)

Summary: Relates to the ability off CCRCs to offer

seniors additional service options.

Position: Support

Outcome: This bill passed both the Assembly and Senate, and awaits action by the Governor.

Criminal History in ACFs

A.5476-D (Gottfried)-S.4926 -C (Hannon)

Summary: Requires the review of the criminal history of prospective employees of adult homes, enriched housing programs or residences for adults; extends effectiveness.

Position: Support

Outcome: This bill passed both the Assembly and Senate, and awaits action by the Governor.

ER Management Plans for Home Care/Hospice

A.6530-B (Cusick)-S.4719-B (Lanza)

Summary: Requires counties and cities with a population of one million or more to prepare comprehensive emergency management plans.

Position: Support

Outcome: This bill passed both the Assembly and Senate, and awaits action by the Governor.

Legislation Failing to Advance to the Governor

These bills have passed either the Assembly or Senate or remained in committee.

Mandatory Reporting of Abuse in ACFs

A.525 (Magnarelli)

Summary: Establishes mandatory reporting of alleged incidents of abuse, mistreatment or neglect of residents in adult care facilities.

Position: Oppose

Outcome: Remained in Assembly Codes.

Parking Permits

A.1258 (Colton)-S.1868 (Stavisky)

Summary: Permits licensed physician, visiting nurse, nurse, physical therapist or chiropractor to park where parking is prohibited if vehicle is identified by special placard.

Position: Support

Outcome: Remained in Assembly and Senate

Transportation.

Overtime for Certified Nursing Assistants

A.1403 (Gunther)-S.1054 (Maziarz)

Summary: Puts restrictions on the number of

consecutive hours a CNA can work.

Position: Oppose

Outcome: Remained in Assembly and Senate Labor.

Hours Worked by Nurses

A.1632 (Gunther)-S.1673 (Grisanti)

Summary: Relates to hours worked by nurses.

Position: Oppose

Outcome: Remained in Assembly Labor and Senate

Labor.

Personal Expense Allowance

A.1980 (Titus)

Summary: Relates to the personal expense allowance for residents of residential health care facilities receiving or eligible to receive supplemental security income payments.

Position: Support

Outcome: Remained in Assembly Social Services.

Petition for Temporary or Permanent Receivership

A.2368-A (Weinstein)

Summary: Establishes a cause of action by residents of adult facilities to petition for temporary or permanent receivership.

Position: Oppose

Outcome: Remained on the Assembly Calendar.

CHRC Maintenance Workers

A.2759 (Reilich)

Summary: Relates to criminal history records of

maintenance employees in adult residential health and assisted living facilities.

Position: Oppose

Outcome: Remained in Assembly Health.

Nursing Home Diversion

A.3139 (Gottfried)

Summary: Subjects nursing homes not providing basic standards of care to nursing home diversion.

Position: Oppose

Outcome: Removed from Assembly Health

Telemedicine/Telehealth Task Force

A.3330 (Morelle)

Summary: Enacts the "New York State Telehealth/Telemedicine Development Act."

Position: Support

Outcome: Remained in Assembly Health.

Managed Long Term Care Plans

Summary: Relates to MLTCPs not being controlled

or owned by for-profit HMOs or insurers.

A.4472 (Gottfried)

Summary: Relates to long term home health care

program enhancement.

Position: Support

Outcome: Remained in Assembly Health.

A.5147-A (Gottfried)-S.5893 (Rivera)

Summary: Relates to death and felony crime

reports in certain ACFs.

Position: Oppose

Outcome: Passed Assembly and remained in Senate

Social Services.

RN at EALRs and SNALRs

A.5168-A (Gottfried)-S.1417-A (Montgomery)

Summary: Relates to requiring a registered nurse on staff at facilities certified for enhanced assisted

living or special needs assisted living.

Violations in Residential Care Programs

A.5201 (Gottfried)-S.1662 (Grisanti)

Summary: Relates to penalties for violations relating to residential care programs for adults.

A.5353-A (Gottfried)-S.6447 (Rivera)

Summary: Provides for the exclusion of certain costs associated with home health care.

Summary: Relates to rules and regulations pertaining to the operation of social adult day care

programs.

Summary: Creates a temporary state commission to study and investigate the effects of closures of long term care facilities on the residents of such facilities and their families.
