

Staffing Crisis Makes Nursing Home Hour Mandate Impossible

Non-profit homes meet minimum spending requirements but still find it impossible to hire workers to meet staffing mandate

Nursing Home Spending and Staffing Mandates	Not-for-Profit and Public Nursing Home Compliance

- Even though 85% of public and non-profit nursing homes meet the minimum spending requirements, nearly 2/3 find it impossible to comply with the 3.5 nursing hour mandate. Most of these homes have operating losses exacerbated by COVID.
- To date, the state has provided no financial assistance to nursing homes for COVID-19 or for staffing to comply with this mandate. The 2021-22 Budget allocated \$64 M for nursing home staffing, but none of those dollars has been distributed to providers.



Both of these laws are in effect as of 4/1/22 and nursing homes stand to be penalized for their staffing levels, even as the Governor acknowledges there is a healthcare workforce crisis with her most recent Executive Order, "Statewide Disaster Emergency Due to Healthcare Staffing Shortages in the State of New York" (E.O. 4.7).

Enforcing an impossible mandate during the staffing crisis will only result in heavy daily fines that deplete the very resources that nursing homes need for staff wages and training. **Enforcing the mandate now will also limit admissions of new residents, creating backlogs in hospitals that need to discharge patients,** and risking the hospital bed shortages the state experienced as the Omicron variant reached its peak in New York.

LeadingAge NY data analysis reveals that more than 12,000 new nurses and aides are needed to comply with the 3.5 nurse hour requirement, after accounting for all mandates, days off, and increased admissions to free up hospital beds.

Nursing Home Residents Need Elected Officials to:

- Provide a substantial increase in Medicaid rates to enable the state and nursing homes to recruit, train, and compensate the workforce needed to comply with this new requirement;
- ➤ <u>Delay the enforcement</u> of the 3.5 nurse hour staffing minimum for nursing homes to provide time for new staff to be recruited and trained; and
- Authorize the use of medication aides in the nursing home, as proposed by the Governor, and as is already permitted in approximately 25 other states, and in other programs in New York.
