FIRST SHORT-STAY REHABILITATION SMALL HOUSE OPENS IN WESTCHESTER

The New Jewish Home's Westchester Campus adds to signature programs

(June 19, 2018 – Mamaroneck, New York) – A new short-stay rehabilitation small house officially opened at **The New Jewish Home's** Westchester County skilled nursing campus in Mamaroneck, New York on Tuesday.

As one of the nation's largest and most diversified nonprofit older adult health care systems, The New Jewish Home provides rehabilitation, skilled nursing and health care programs to over 12,000 older adults of all faiths and ethnicities annually.



The new 4,010-square foot shortstay rehabilitation small house facility combines The New Jewish Home's successful rehabilitation program with its signature small house program, allowing residents to enjoy the highest level of skilled care while living in a comfortable, non-institutional setting.

"The New Jewish Home offers unique programs to provide skilled and compassionate health care for older adults," noted **Jeffrey I.** Farber, M.D., President and CEO of The New Jewish Home.

"With the opening of our new short-stay rehabilitation suite, the first of its kind in Westchester, we are continuing this tradition. Clients get the care they need to make a successful transition back home after an acute illness, chronic disease exacerbation, injury, or surgery."

The New Jewish Home's Westchester campus offers post-acute rehabilitation and long-term skilled nursing, and is the only facility in the county to offer care in a traditional nursing home setting as well as in small house communities.

The new small house facility currently hosts 11 residents at a time with three private and four semi-private rooms, a dining room, kitchen and state-of-the art rehabilitation gym.
